Dear Parents and Carers,

Year 11 Parents' Evening and more

Thank you to all Year 11 parents and carers who took part in last night's parents' evening. It's clearly an important evening, and the timing is deliberate. Mock exams are still reasonably fresh in the memory, but students have had (hopefully) a decent rest over Christmas and time to process things. The calendar has turned to 2023, there is the opportunity for resolutions and changes, application deadlines loom for FE and Sixth Form places in September, and the first "sit down" exams are just over four months away. "Year 11" is of course 179 individual students; some are doing brilliantly, staying organised and working hard; others need a kick up the backside and to spend much less time on electronic devices. The point is that four months is plenty of time to make a difference. My colleagues will have been able to provide both general and specific suggestions for improvement.

Mentioning Sixth Form, Year 11 students thinking of A-levels should seriously consider staying here. Students do really well: 2022 results were our best ever, and this year three students secured Oxbridge interviews with one being offered a place subject to grades. The size of the Sixth Form has many advantages: we really do know our students well, and can genuinely provide very individualised support. Class sizes also mean that relationships between staff and students are excellent, which is fundamental to student confidence and success. Also, these working relationships are quite different to those in Year 11. (In Ofsted terms, the Sixth Form was "good" in 2019, and we're expecting that this judgement will continue as we have improved since then).

Mentioning application deadlines and options facing Year 11s for September, one option significantly different from parents' leaving-school experiences 20 years ago is doing an apprenticeship. Traffic News

Transport issues are not a module in the professional qualification required to be a Headteacher, but really should be.....This is rapidly becoming a weekly feature. The good news is that the Station Road flood has now been sorted out (problem with a blocked drain due to agricultural detritus in a collection chamber, apparently). More good news is that Stagecoach have much improved their service at the end of the day, ironically only to sit in queues of traffic at Venny Bridges.....

This has been a major headache this week. From the College's point of view late arrivals are a problem, missing registration, arriving at lessons late, and causing inevitable disruption to teaching and learning. Worse, there are safety and safeguarding concerns: students waiting far longer than normal at bus stops, much later home than expected, and this is exacerbated for students who take two buses to get home. I have made my views clear to local councillors (who are very supportive) and the local council.

Clutching at positives, once parents had adjusted to the situation, left earlier, found other routes, the number of late arrivals have reduced during the week. So, thank you for your help with this, and your flexibility. I am told that there have been a number of meetings involving Devon County Council and the contractors, with several ideas for reducing the problems being discussed. Watch this space.

On the subject of avoiding the queues, I have been asked how early students can arrive at school. We don't have a hard-and-fast time, but in normal times the guideline is not before 08.15 please and students must go to the Giraffe House (or Post-16 if a Sixth Former). The reason is that we cannot guarantee supervision, but by 08.15 there is a steady stream of staff passing the Giraffe House. Times aren't normal, so if a few students are here at say 08.00 for a couple of weeks it won't be a problem; repeat, early arrivals must go to the Giraffe House.

Late marks. By and large, we're exercising common sense and a bit of professional judgement. It's usually possible to work out whether students are genuinely late because of the roadworks and if so, we are marking them present (there is no official code for "late because of roadworks beyond anyone's control"). It's also usually possible to identify students who are, let's say, not as good at being punctual with or without roadworks, and we will be a bit more suspicious. The serious issue, which I've made clear to Devon, is one of safeguarding. If a child is really late – as on Tuesday morning – they will be marked absent on the register and the lesson one register. This is then spotted by Student Absence who phones home a) to make sure the child is safe and b) if they are absent, why? However, this causes alarm because as far as the parent knows, the child should be at school. Although we're aware of this issue, it might still occur now and again, so apologies in advance.

Health News

There is a great deal of concern about infectious illnesses, and the pressure on the NHS. Accordingly, Devon County Council and Public Health Devon are regularly sending reminders to schools. The UKHSA are especially worried about high levels of Strep A infections, and I have sent their letter to parents about Strep A and Scarlet Fever separately; you will also see the poster "should I keep my child off school" poster later in this Newsletter. I am also happy to reinforce the basic messages about preventive controls: these include good hand hygiene and "catch it, bin it, kill it".

Little Shop of Horrors

Very excited again – I enjoy a good musical, and all the better when it features the incredibly talented students of Clyst Vale ! Timid flower shop assistant Seymour has a soft spot for his ditzy but beautiful colleague Audrey. 

Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Please let the College know of any absence on the first day it occurs.

If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness.

If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy.

Please note, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if a student is absent from College due to illness.

Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first, and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. Therefore, we ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment, if they can.

Thank you for your support in helping your child maximise their attendance and learning.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. **If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.**

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers - Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers - Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- Skirts - Blue Tartan and knee length
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn.
- Black sturdy shoes or **all black** trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

All uniform and PE Kit can be purchased from Thomas Moore, Exeter. Thomas Moore offers both a personal service in their shop and also the opportunity to order online at www.thomasmooretoymaster.co.uk

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
