

Twinning association visit to Brittany next summer

For year 11 pupils and above, and their parents and family, this summer there is a superb opportunity to visit the seaside resort of Plobannalec-Lesconil on the south coast of Brittany, a trip that is being organised and funded by Broadclyst Twinning Association. Plobannalec-Lesconil has been twinned with Broadclyst and has hosted visits from pupils of Clyst Vale for many years. As you can see from the photos, it's a lovely seaside resort and fishing village. It's in a beautiful area of countryside just 2-3 hours from the ferry terminal at Roscoff. The trip is free, including travel, for Clyst Vale pupils, kindly funded by the Twinning Association. Each pupil must be accompanied by a parent or guardian, but any accompanying family will also be hosted for free and will have to pay only the cost of crossing the channel from Plymouth to Roscoff as a foot passenger. You will be taken to the boat at Plymouth for free and collected at Roscoff free of charge by our hosts. All accommodation and food will be free. It may be necessary to put a cap on numbers so please reserve your place. You will have the adventure of staying in a French family with young people of the same age.

There is no requirement to speak French or to have studied or wish to learn French, as the host families are keen to try out their English and are also very keen for their own teenagers to try out their English.

The trip is planned for 10th to 15th July so after GCSEs and A levels but before the end of term, so perfect timing. The weather should be hot (well a bit hotter than here) and the sea will be warm (well warmer than here). 
Post 16 News and Job of the Week

SURGEON

Surgeons are medical professionals responsible for diagnosing and treating a wide range of conditions that require surgical intervention. Their role involves performing operations to repair injuries, treat diseases, or improve bodily functions. Surgeons specialise in various areas such as general surgery, orthopaedics, neurosurgery, cardiovascular surgery, or plastic surgery. They assess patients' conditions through physical examinations, medical histories, and diagnostic tests, and determine whether surgery is the best course of action. In addition to performing surgeries, they may also be involved in post-operative care, including monitoring patients' recovery and managing complications.

Newly qualified surgeons starting their careers typically earn around £30,000 to £40,000 during their foundation training years. Once they complete their core surgical training and enter specialty training, salaries increase to approximately £40,000 to £60,000. After becoming a consultant surgeon, which can take over a decade of training, salaries typically range from £80,000 to £120,000 annually, depending on the specialty and the NHS trust or private hospital they work for.



Under 16 County Cup

Okehampton College 1-1 Clyst Vale (*Okehampton win 5-4 on penalties)

Congratulations to the Year 11 lads which represented the College immaculately on Tuesday afternoon, both on and off the field. The field was a 4G astroturf surface at the Ashbury Manor Golf Resort which Okehampton College have donated for them to use for fixtures such as these. This was a real treat for the lads and coupled with them donning a brand new strip from sponsors UK Football Trials and a warm and sunny climate paved the way for a superb afternoon out of school. The first 10 minutes of the game was poor for Clyst Vale with us conceding a soft goal after failing to clear the immediate danger from inside the area. Despite this, the lads rallied and finished the first half much the better side and twice rattled the crossbar with thumping shots from both Charlie King and Kiaran Gillard.

Jack Sussex had complete control from the back as goalkeeper, with Harry O'Donnell and Harry Bidder being strong centre backs for the visitors. Seb Frontini and Josh Hovell were threatening on the edges for us with Theo Barefoot, Tom Ruddlesden, King and Gillard linking plenty of attacks for the strikers of Kye Letheren and Harry Metherell. On came substitutes Alfie Thompson and Josh Moyes in the second half and both added excellent touches both at left back and in midfield, respectively, however Moyes was later forced off with a knee injury.

Clyst Vale got their just rewards after the break when Charlie King delivered a perfect free kick into the top left corner. Clyst Vale remained on top but just could not get the crucial goal to take them into the next round, despite three crucial saves from their keeper to deny striker Metherell from close range.

The dreaded penalty shootout then ensued with Okehampton College coming out 5-4 winners with Jack Sussex doing all he could to keep the shots out, however they were all well taken as were Clyst Vale's opportunities from the spot.

Reporting an Absence

Parents are expected to inform us of their child's absence before 9.00 a.m. on each day of absence providing the reason for absence. If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness. If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy. In addition, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if your child is absent from College due to illness.

Lateness

The school day (first registration session) starts at 8.50 am, all students are expected to be in their classroom at this time.


Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. We ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment if they can.

Please give the school as much notice as possible, at least two weeks' notice is useful.

If the appointment requires the pupil to leave during the day, they must be signed out by an adult listed on the student's record at the main reception.
